One problematic area in this research was the extent of the casualties suffered during the Channel Dash action, no two published accounts give the same figures and the average of four dead and sixteen to twentyseven injured were very much lower than my father's estimate and, after all, he was there at the time. One crew member commented "a few days later we marched up the hill at Shotley to bury the dead." It seemed reasonable to follow the instructions so I went to Shotley, marched up the hill and found sixteen graves there which, at the least proved that there were more than four killed.

The opening paragraph of Cdr. Coats' Report of Proceedings states "List of casualties has been reported" but enquiries at all the sources open to me failed to find this list so I wrote to Doc Jackson (the Surgeon Lt. aboard that day) enquiring where such a list would have been sent thinking that it might be easier to trace the list forwards from 1942 than backwards from 1998. I was staggered and delighted to receive a charming letter from him enclosing a copy of the casualty report which are still in his possession after fifty odd years! The copies are very faint so have been retyped though in many cases service numbers cannot be relied on.
